35708 Edinburgh Slavery Consultation

The recent Consultation regarding Edinburgh Slavery closed on 19 January.

Under the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) anyone answering should be provided with a transparent and clear privacy notice which explains how their data will be processed. This was not provided.

No option was available to keep personal information confidential. Answers and comments with identifying details could be made available through information access requests.

Do you agree that the consultation process failed in its legal requirements to comply with the GDP Regulations?
