The Council has made significant efforts to raise awareness of damp and mould amongst tenants and encourage reporting, including articles in the Council's newsletter for tenants, development of an information booklet, production of fridge magnets and awareness training with a wide range of services across the Council. The Council's Preservation Team is also developing an e-learning module for staff, and a video that can be shared online with tenants to help raise awareness of damp and mould, and action that can be taken to help prevent it. The Council has also installed damp sensors in 500 homes to assist with early identification and intervention.
